Alessandra Gelmi is a graduate of Dartmouth College and Columbia University. After receiving her master's degree, she was awarded a teaching fellowship from Boston University, where she taught creative

writing under the aegis of three Nobel Laureates.

Her literary awards include the Irene Leache Memorial Prize and the Amy Loveman Competition. A former member of The White House Correspondents' Association, Alessandra has written for three



national dailies, dozens of magazines, and has interviewed personalities from Stallone to Coretta Scott King. Her original plays *He and She* and *Falling Stars* were first performed at The Source Theatre Festival in Washington, D.C. *Falling Stars* won first prize in its category at The Source and later at The National Theater.
